Continuing our 'Journey to Holiness' this autumn and winter



Holiness comes through deairing to love God, with all our heart, mind, soul and strength.

'Journeying to Holiness' has been underlain most of the special events we have organised over the last year. Holiness is our vocation. In the coming months, we continue with **talks on Holiness**, drawing on the inspiration of some more important saints. Now we offer an opportunity to learn more **about Saints important to the religious communities in our neighbouring parishes.**

1. <u>This Thursday</u> in the Hall, Fr John Dickson, the Rector of the local Salesian Community in Sacred Heart Parish (Brother Paulin's Superior), will share with us about Saint John Bosco, their Nineteenth Century founder: his talk is called 'Education is a matter of the Heart' – Saint John Bosco and the Salesian Spirit. He will explore what Salesian Spirituality means and its history, and how St John Bosco adapted this to educating young people in the Turin slums of his day. Refreshments from 7pm, talk at 7.30pm. In Lent, we will have a talk about Saint Alphonsus Liguori, who founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, which has served Saint Mary's Parish in Clapham since the Nineteenth Century.

2. On <u>Friday 6 December at 7pm</u>, we hold another of our Services of Adoration Prayer and Reconciliation. Note the date and come and join in.

As our parish community starts on its Advent journey towards Christmas, here is an **ideal moment to prepare.** 'Come back to me with all your heart'. <u>We invite you and your family and children</u> to join us for an **Advent evening of Reconciliation and Mercy:** come and adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament in prayer, receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and enjoy some time of peace, prayer and music. These Services are for all, and *particularly for our First Holy Communion and Confirmation families*. Provision will be made to care for your younger children while you receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Confessions will be available in English, French, Italian.

If you came to these services earlier in the year, come again. If you enjoyed the experience, invite others to come with you. If you couldn't come last time, come along this time.

2025: A 'Jubilee Year' of Hope

Every 25 years (and sometimes on other occasions) **the Church celebrates a 'Holy Year'** – a year-long period of renewal. Next year will be such a Jubilee Year, and Pope Francis has given it a theme: **'Pilgrims of Hope'**. He is concerned that, in the difficult times in which we live, we rekindle this great Christian virtue in our individual lives, and in the Church as a sign of hope for humanity. He writes: '*The Jubilee of 2025, a holy year that I wanted to dedicate to the theme "Pilgrims of Hope", is a propitious occasion to reflect on this fundamental and decisive Christian virtue – especially in times like the ones we are living, in which the third world war being fought "piecemeal" that is unfolding before our eyes can lead us to assume attitudes of gloomy discouragement and ill-concealed cynicism.*

'Hope, on the other hand, is a gift and a task for every Christian. It is a gift because it is God who offers it to us. Hoping, in fact, is not a mere act of optimism, like when we sometimes hope to pass an exam at university ("Let's hope we make it") or when we hope for good weather for the trip out of town on a Sunday in the spring ("Let's hope for good weather"). No, hoping is waiting for something that has already been given to us: salvation in God's eternal and infinite love. That love, that salvation that gives flavour to our lives and that constitutes the hinge on which the world remains standing, despite all the wickedness and nefariousness caused by our sins as men and women. To hope, then, is to welcome this gift that God offers us every day. To hope is to savour the wonder of being loved, sought, desired by a God who has not shut Himself away in His impenetrable heavens but has made Himself flesh and blood, history and days, to share our lot.

'Hope is also a task that Christians have a duty to cultivate and put to good use for the sake of all their brothers and sisters.' Read the full text <u>here</u>

Other News

The New Lectionary will come into use on 1 December

The Lectionary is the name for the collections of Scripture readings and psalms used in the Liturgy, principally at Mass, and for the other Sacraments. For some time, work has been going on to produce a fresh translation which, it is claimed, will be more faithful to the original languages, use better and more up-to-date biblical scholarship, and be "more proclaimable". We will certainly notice a difference: we have used the current translation for most of our lifetimes.

We have purchased these new Liturgical Books: four volumes, plus a Processional Gospel Book. Those familiar as Readers with our present volumes will know that most were in need of replacement in any case, as covers have come away and the pages are dogeared. We have received the new books, and will display them on Sunday. **Would any parishioner like to 'sponsor' an individual volume**, perhaps in memory of somebody? – a dedication plate can be put inside the front of a volume. If anyone wishes to do so, have a word with me: the four Volumes to be used at the Lectern cost £150 each, and the Book of the Gospels (for more solemn occasions) £235.

The Eternal Life we hope for: 'we shall be like him because we shall see him as he really is'

During November, we Catholics pray particularly for our loved ones who have died (the 'Holy Souls'). We pray that they will come to share the future we hope to enjoy after death – the fulness of that divine life we have already begun to share with God by his grace, here and now.

Please make offerings for Masses for the Holy Souls: <u>special envelopes</u> are available at the back of Church, or you can use the Card Reader option. They will be celebrated through the coming year.

- Offerings should be *gift-aided*, by signing the back of the envelope. **Every £10 donated** ensures one Holy Souls' Mass will be offered for *all the Faithful Departed*. **You can also make offerings using the special option on our Card Reader**.
- You may also enclose with the offering the names of deceased relatives, parents or friends they will all be included *collectively* whenever a 'Holy Souls' Mass' is offered here.

Do also write names in our **'Book of Remembrance'**, which throughout November is on the table before the Altar. Do pray for all whose names are there and, if you wish, add names of your deceased relatives or friends on the sheets which are then put into it. All will be prayed for at Mass during this month.

For all who have died in warfare, particularly the two World Wars, and the grieving and injured.

For the Faithful Departed, particularly those loved ones named in our November List of Remembrance.

For our Teenagers who have begun to prepare to be Confirmed next April - that they may persevere in deepening their following of Our Lord; and for the younger children who have already begun their preparations for their First Holy Communion next May.
