Praying for Unity between Christians - especially 18 - 25 January

When Jesus gathered with his disciples for their Last Supper, during the meal he instituted the Eucharist and bequeathed it to us, he commanded that his disciples should celebrate it in his memory, he made them his first priests, and washed their feet. And, for the last time, he instructed them about following him in love.

Saint John's Gospel passes on to us Our Lord's final words: in which he gave us 'the new commandment of love' and reflected at length about how **love was to be the characteristic of those who follow him**, binding them to him and to one another like branches of the one vine. He promised us the guiding of the Holy Spirit to lead us into the fulness of his truth.

**His final words (chapter 17), were a solemn prayer**, sometimes called his 'High Priestly Prayer'. In it, he prayed to God his Father above all that his followers might find and maintain a deep unity between them that would reflect the unity between Jesus himself and his Father and the Holy Spirit. He prayed 'that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me.' (John 17, 21). Unity between Christians is imperative, both in order that we experience God's life within us to the full and also that the

world may come more easily to believe in Jesus its Saviour. His Prayer ends by asking 'that the love with which you [the Father] have loved me may be in them, and I in them' (John 17, 26).



Sadly, Christian history has been very different, as the experience of this country (and many others) shows; and love of Christians for one another has often been far from characteristic of their relationships. At last, above all in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, for a variety of reasons, Christians began to seek earnestly to overcome their disagreements and division. And in the **1960s** the Second Vatican Council of the Catholic Church played an enormous part, for through it the Catholic Church committed itself fully to this 'ecumenical movement'. Many steps closer between the Christian churches have been made over the succeeding six decades, but much more still needs to take place.

The Vatican Office (in which I worked for eight years in the 1990s) was set up at the time of the Vatican Council. Now known as the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity (DPCU), its work is to foster the search for unity in every aspect of our Church's life, especially through prayer, dialogue, fellowship and outreach with our Christian brothers and sisters. This is why, together with the World Council of Churches, **it encourages Christians across the world to pray fervently for unity**, especially by promoting the 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity' each year, which usually runs from 18 to 25 January. Progress in fostering unity can only be possible if Christians desire this and let it be at the heart of their prayer.

Each year, the suggestions for prayer and worship in the Week of Prayer Different are prepared by different groups of Christians – 2025's come from a religious community in northern Italy. They want us to reflect and **pray about John 11**, **17 – 27** (especially Jesus' words '*Do you believe this*?'). Whether you use all their suggestions or not, why not at least **make a prayer each day** (perhaps thinking and praying especially for family members or friends who are not Catholics, or for our other local Churches) – in your own words, or you might use this prayer from the French *Chemin neuf* community:

Lord Jesus, who prayed that all might be one, we pray to you for the unity of all Christians, according to your will, according to your means. May your Spirit enable us to experience the suffering caused by division, to see our sin and to hope beyond all hope. Amen.

# The Lord's Baptism and ours

In his Baptism by John at the river Jordan, the public revelation of Jesus as the only Son of the Father began – the start of that journey which ended on the Cross. It is a journey during which he manifests to us the life he shares with his divine Father in the Holy Spirit – the life of the Blessed Trinity, which is the life we have all begun to share since we ourselves were baptised.

On this Sunday's Feast of Christ's Baptism and during the days ahead might we **reflect and pray about our own baptism**?

- When did it happen? Do we know the date? If not, why not try to look it up?
- Do we thank God that our parents wanted us to become Christians by having us baptised? Do you thank God for their faith?
- At our baptism, the minister declared that we were 'now children of God'; have you prayed about that marvellous fact, or thought of it especially when you pray 'Our Father' as Jesus taught us?
- Why not pray in thanksgiving for your baptism, as a family?

The Feasts of the Epiphany (last Sunday) and the Baptism (this Sunday) are not just recalling the past. The mystery and glory of Christ Jesus our Saviour 'manifests' itself to you and me today. How? Not in a stable, nor



at the river Jordan, not usually in miracles. But he does do so in the life of the Church, in the Church's sacraments, especially the Holy Eucharist. And he speaks his word to us through the Scriptures we hear at Mass or read for ourselves. He does this so that we may grow in that new life as children of God which we began to share at our baptism.

The Lord desires us to grow. He does not want our faith to remain passive as it was if we were baptised as an infant; or childish as when we received Holy Communion for the first time; or even as it was when we were confirmed. In this New Year, he says to us again now 'Follow me!'

Many of us know people, sometimes in our own families or among our friends, whose faith has grown weak and who no longer join in the life of the Church into which they were baptised. At Mass this Sunday, we shall offer you a Prayer Card, which you could use to keep them in prayer, in the hope that they will rediscover the love of Christ.
