<u>Did you know?</u> Parliament gave <u>700 hours</u> to the Banning of Fox Hunting; it only allocated a few hours (I believe 7 so far) to debating such the huge proposal to change our care for the sick and dying!

The current Bill would make many vulnerable people – including the elderly and the disabled – feel a burden on their family, or carers, or the wider society, resulting in pressure to end their lives.

Following the Master: 'Love your enemies. Be merciful'

This Sunday we hear more from the 'Sermon on the Plain'. Our Lord's words have at their heart his command 'Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you' (6, 27). He repeats this teaching often – indeed, it runs through Sunday's Gospel passage. Yet how much resistance it encounters. We would probably all say it is central to being one of his disciples, but also admit that our instincts often run in the opposite direction. And we see the apparently 'powerful' like Trump and Putin constantly responding with spite, retaliation and threats. We too may feel that temptation to take revenge when we're slighted, or worse; or, at the very least,



we would like to make it clear to that person how hurt we feel. Forgiveness and reconciliation can hardly seem a realistic option — what if they treat us the same way again! All we often manage is to try not to take our feelings of hurt too much to heart. Peter, you recall, asked if he should forgive as many as seven times! And how did Jesus answer?

The evil others may do us must not triumph over us. 'Bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you', Jesus says. This should be the hallmark of the Christian because it is the supreme example given us by the death of Christ: 'While we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son', teaches Saint Paul (Romans 5,10). God did not merely tolerate us sinners, let alone exact vengeance on us, he went so far as to love us by sending his only Son, Jesus the one who showed us the merciful love of God.

If we could be in any doubt, Jesus teaches us to pray 'forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us'. The Lord's desire is that, wherever there is hatred or rancour, we spread love: 'forgive, and you will be forgiven', he says. And, in Saint Luke's Gospel, that was his dying lesson: 'Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.' (23, 34).

Sunday's First Reading, with the Gospel in view, sets us off on this path of reflection with the example of David. He was being hunted down in the wilderness by vindictive King Saul, who saw him as a rival and wanted to do away with him. A reversal of fortune, however, put Saul in David's power. How should he act?



Abishai, David's soldier companion, is quite clear. He tells him what most would have done, seeing an opportunity to kill Saul while he slept: 'God has given your enemy into your hand this day. Now please let me pin him to the earth with one stroke of the spear, and I will not strike him twice.' Despite this, David continued to respect God's choice of Saul. He spared him, confident in his ultimate 'reward': 'The Lord rewards every man for his righteousness and his faithfulness, for the Lord gave you into my hand today, and I would not put out my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

Jesus' teaching goes far beyond that response, however: his disciples are not merely to renounce responding to violence with violence, or replying to harsh words with more harsh words. He asks us to love, which alone has the power to change situations. 'If you love those who love you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners do the same.' 'Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful.'

The reward Jesus talks about for those who love like that is the only reward that could really matter: 'your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil.' Our Lord is very certain that some of his followers, empowered by his Holy Spirit, will take this road. It is the only way to a real 'victory' over those who do us wrong, the victory of love – and through the ages, countless examples, especially among those facing persecution and martyrdom, show that this is so.

Through Lent to Easter and our Pilgrimage to Pentecost

We are part of the Body of Christ in South Battersea, part of the Church of Southwark diocese. As the diocesan *Called to Bear Fruit* process happens, we also work together here in hope for renewal in our own lives and as a Parish community. The Jubilee Year of Hope calls us to this.

In Lent, we shall reflect on three Sundays during March, about our Parish life together. We ask you to consider how each of you can build up the Body of Christ among us, by offering your time and talents, and your financial support too, to help deepen our Parish life.

We begin our Lenten journey of repentance and renewal at Mass on Ash Wednesday (5 March)

- On Friday 7 March at 7pm we will hold another Service of Adoration and Reconciliation. As in Advent, there will be other visiting priests available for Confessions.
 - **This event is for the whole Parish**. It is especially in the Calendar of sessions for the families preparing their children and young people for their First Holy Communion, and for the Confirmation youngsters.
- After Friday morning Masses, Stations of the Cross.
- On Saturday 15 March some of our young people will be attending the Flame Gathering for Young Catholics from across the country at Wembley. Pray that it will touch the hearts of those who go.
- On Thursday 3 April, Stuart Edwards will give a talk about Padre Pio, The Curé of Ars, and Confession.
- On Saturday 5 April at 4pm there will be Stations of the Cross and Adoration.

From Easter to Pentecost a time of Prayer and Renewal across the whole Diocese

- o will lead to the Jubilee Day at The Friars, Aylesford on Saturday 7 June. Note this date now we have organised a parish Coach.
- At 11am Mass on Sunday 27 April Canon Gerard Bradley will be here to Confirm our 11 candidates.
- We are organising a local Jubilee Walking Pilgrimage with people from neighbouring parishes on Saturday 10 May (keep the date – details to follow).
- First Holy Communions will be celebrated at 11am Mass on Sunday 11 May.
- o Brother Paulin will likely be ordained a Deacon at Sacred Heart Parish on 15 June.
